"I have always been attracted to the intricacies of nature, whether it is the veins of a cicada wing, the stamens of an artichoke flower, or the whorls of a cowrie shell. The tiny details are so appealing. As I work, I develop an intimate relationship with my subjects through hours of close inspection and carefully considered composition.

A recurring theme throughout Natural Perspective is the seemingly random combinations of fragile natural elements alongside the sturdy inorganic. I am intrigued by such contrast. Timeworn household utensils are positioned alongside floral studies that will quickly decompose, or oriental-style containers hold perfect blooms captured in their prime. Each painting includes an image of the natural world juxtaposed with an object of distant origin.

Every element of the paintings depict something personal, most having been part of my family, or those close to me, for many years. Vintage cutlery, blue and white vases and plates, flowers, common garden plants or birds: all trigger memories that become portraits with an underlying story.

Some artworks are simply a celebration of nature, repetitive and meditative in their inherent design, replicated in my practice."
